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From Your Minister

Rev. Diana

Dear Ones,

I'm writing this as I've just finished attending our annual UU ministers' professional gathering of Ministry Days and as our national General Assembly of congregations is just beginning. Last night our congregation's Board of Trustees invited staff to join the board meeting to work on developing our 2024-25 vision of ministry. And so, I'm writing this to you from a place of wondering, from a place of liminality, from a place of creative emergence where we – we who lead this congregation, we who are ministers in Iowa and Nebraska, we who are professional and lay leaders from around and beyond this country – are working to find the meaning, the shape, the story of this past year and are working to discern what our congregations and wider communities will need in the coming year.

I find sitting with questions particularly powerful in moments like this. Questions that are bubbling up for me right now include:

- How can we create conditions that help our congregations and communities remember the hope?
- What is our key work this coming year for nourishing resilience in the face of what is happening in our state and nationally, in response to what is happening in individual lives, and mindful of where our community is?
- How is our past and how we have coped with the past affecting our responses today?
- In what ways will we work to create stronger networks of solidarity and dismantle silos?
- How are we calling ourselves and each other ever more into the work of Love, through how
 we support each other and how we deepen our anti-racism/anti-oppression work?
- How can our congregations be some of the hope we need?
- What work do we need to do in our congregation to help it be a beacon of Love and justice even more?

These are big questions, but I love sitting with them – particularly when I get to work with other folks like our Board of Trustees, staff, and other lay leaders on discerning what they mean to us and how we'll respond. This is part of the joy of ministry. And it's part of the joy of summer. Due to the patterns of congregational life, this is one of the big times I get to help us sit with questions like these and work with leaders to turn our responses into a vision of ministry and program planning.

I'm excited for the coming weeks when this visioning and planning work will take clearer shape, we will have a vision of ministry to share with the wider congregation, and more team and committee leads will join in program planning and calendaring. This is such a generative moment!

To help with that, my schedule will be a bit different for the next two months. I will be away from UUS for several weeks this summer. Following General Assembly, I'm taking some study leave from **June 24 – July 7**. I will also be taking a week of study leave from **July 16 – 23**. During study leave I get to study, reflect, plan, and prepare for the coming year. To support that, I do not read or respond to email while I'm on study leave. I will be reachable on my cell phone for pastoral emergencies. You can also reach out to the Pastoral Care Associates by calling Virginia Melroy or emailing pastoralcare@uusic.org. Please reach out to the appropriate staff person for other needs.

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Then I'll be on vacation from **July 29 – August 11** for a long-anticipated camping trip in Yellowstone National Park. While I'm on vacation, staff and the Pastoral Care Team will be responding to urgent needs. The Board of Trustees and staff will be able to reach me if there is an emergency that requires my attention (with some limitations due to being in the wilderness).

This summer, as we engage with big questions, whether they're similar to the ones I posed above or ones generated from each of our lives, may each of us find and create some space to rest, to sit in stillness, to talk with those we trust, or to engage with whatever other practice helps us find some of our answers, some of our clarity. Because to survive and thrive we need one another and we need our collective wisdom.

GREEN SANCTUARY

Juneteenth Green Sanctuary Potluck and Program!

Over 25 folks showed up to share salads, bean dishes (traditional for Juneteenth), casseroles, cookies, brownies, and fruit at our first potluck. Because it was Juneteenth, we did a deep read of General Order No. 3, the notice informing enslaved people in Texas that they were free. Discussion focused on the inconsistency of telling Freedmen they had equal rights with their former enslavers, but advising them to stay and work for those same people. Our Juneteenth observation was linked to Green Sanctuary through Dr. Martin Luther King's writings on the connection of race and environment, a connection later documented in a report by the United Church of Christ that showed race was the number one factor in deciding where toxic waste facilities were located. The program wrapped up by sharing some of Green Sanctuary's work. On another note, everyone remembered to bring their own table service so we kept use of compostable plates down, and made clean-up a breeze.

July Better Together Challenge – Prepare for the Worst

Each month of Better Together we have actions that members of the congregation can take to address climate Mitigation, Adaptation, Resilience, and Justice. Our focus for the summer is Adaptation to the new circumstances created by climate change. One way to adapt is to prepare for the worst.

- For Severe Weather Make a Safety Plan. You can find everything here: weather.gov/ama/severesafetytips
- For a major Disaster After you make a plan for severe weather, you need to plan for the aftermath. You can find everything here: <u>readv.gov/plan</u>
- 3. For Death Thinking about death never killed anyone, but avoiding thinking about it can make it challenging for your family. Fill out an Advanced Medical Directive (ADM) to guide end-of-life choices. Designate a legal guardian for young kids so the court doesn't choose one for you. Make a will so that what is left goes where you want it to go. Start by writing your wishes down and then use these resources to help formalize your plans.

PRISON MINISTRY

The Prison Ministry Team "endeavors to become informed advocates for justice and build relationships to decrease isolation of those confined in the lowa Justice System." Here are some of our latest efforts:

- The Board meeting on June 4 included two guests. Zaria Rochester of the Inside Out Reentry Community in Iowa City explained the work she does to support formerly incarcerated individuals through that organization. Dr. Mary Cohen of the University of Iowa discussed some of her recent projects advocating for more just and humane treatment of the incarcerated, including an attempt to build a worldwide network of contacts and resources called IMAJIN (International Music and Justice Inquiry Network).
- The Prison Ministry Team sponsored a well-attended screening at FilmScene of Beyond Walls, a program of five short documentaries about prison life, its effects on families of the incarcerated, and life after incarceration. The films argue the need to find alternatives to the U.S. prison-industrial complex. After the screening, there was a panel discussion with incarcerated-rights advocate Sue Hutchins; Michelle Heinz, executive director of the Inside Out Reentry Community; and Ken Greene, a formerly incarcerated individual now part of the Inside Out

- community; after which the audience asked questions. The film and discussion were both well received and PMT successfully raised money through donations that will be used to support incarcerated individuals in lowa.
- The Prison Ministry Team continues to be active through the Pen Pal program. Members regularly correspond with incarcerated individuals either by "snail mail" or through the Iowa Department of Corrections' o-mail system, CorrLinks. We are always looking for volunteers to write to inmates. Incarcerated persons tell us over and over how important it is for them to hear from those of us outside. Just knowing that there are caring people who haven't forgotten them and are willing to spend time writing to them is a deeply meaningful, positive experience for them. And it is very rewarding for volunteers, too. We can set you up with contacts, instructions for using CorrLinks and postal mail, and a sample introductory letter to use or modify as you see fit.
